Payments to producers for the 1960 marketing year will follow the same methods employed for the 1959 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash return from wool sales. The percentage—to be announced later this year—will be that required to raise the national average price received by producers for shorn wool during the marketing year to the incentive price of cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payment will be at a rate per hundred weight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.
